Community Suicide Prevention Roundtable

Waterloo Region Suicide Prevention Council hosted quarterly Community Suicide Prevention Roundtable meetings for knowledge exchange, learning and networking with community stakeholders. Over **100 hours** were given by community members and organizations represented on the Community Round Table.

Grade 8 Mental Health Promotion and Suicide Awareness Presentations

In collaboration with both the Waterloo Region District School Board and the Waterloo Catholic District School Board, WRSPC staff delivered 122 in-person presentations to 2,776 youth. Participants learned about mental well-being and resilience, recognizing warning signs in young people, and how to have a caring and supporting conversation with friends they might be concerned about.

Suicide Awareness and Prevention educational presentations were delivered to **14** organizations for **632** adults.

Trainings

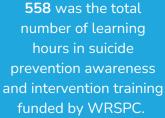
Waterloo Region Suicide Prevention Council partnered with several organizations to provide access to **105 START** and **69 SafeTALK** trainings for free to community members. Designed by LivingWorks, these suicide alertness trainings help to increase safety in our community by teaching how to identify someone who might be struggling, how to reach out to them, and how to connect them to help.

Resources

WRSPC distributed over **16,000 resources** throughout the community, through partnerships with the school boards, local hospitals, and community organizations. Resources such as the Adult and Youth Wallet Resource Cards encourage help-seeking and help-offering by providing information about in-person and virtual options for support.

World Suicide Prevention Day

Hosted a hybrid World Suicide Prevention Day (WSPD) event on September 10, 2022, at the Kitchener Public Library. The event included guest speakers, a butterfly ceremony and an information fair featuring 10 community partners; 186 individuals joined both in-person and virtually.

"Why...?" Support After a Suicide Loss group

After attending a "Why...?" group, participants were more comfortable talking about their loss, had an increased level of hope and were more comfortable accessing resources within the community.

90% of participants agreed or strongly agreed that they "are more comfortable talking about their loss".

Spotlight: Provincial and National Reach

Ontario Suicide Prevention Roundtable (OSPR)

Following the amalgamation of the former Ontario Association for Suicide Prevention and the WRSPC, the OSPR was launched by WRSPC to ensure the provincial voice continues to be supported through the collaboration of suicide prevention organizations across the province. 11 organizations are currently engaged.

National Collaborative for Suicide Prevention (NCSP)

WRSPC actively participated as a Core member of the NCSP. Engagement at the national level allows us to leverage our unique learnings and experiences at the community level and ensures this voice is amplified on a national stage.

WRSPC co-presented "Insights from the Implementation and Evaluation of the Multi-Site Roots of Hope Community Suicide Prevention Project" alongside the Mental Health Commission of Canada at several conference including:

- the American Association for Suicidology in Chicago, IL.,
- the Canadian Association for Suicide Prevention's National Conference in Montreal, QC,
- the 24th International Union for Health Promotion and Education's virtual World Conference on Health Promotion.
